### All Records Broken at R2K Reunion

Ninety nine degrees in the shade, 100% humidity, hanging out in the Shack, playing House Games, lounging pool-side, dancing in the Teen Club 'till dawn. One night in Bangkok? No, the 2000 R2K Royally Connected Reunion in Williamsburg, VA. For three days in August more than 500 ISB alumni, and family members/friends gathered together to find old friends and meet new ones, share memories, build lifelong bonds, and just hangout and have fun. Spanning 40 years of ISB history – from the class of '57 to 1997 - the hotel was abuzz with laughter, conversation and song, 24-hours a day.

R2K broke the record for more than attendance - we had the largest number of volunteers in the 15-year history of the Network. Helping run everything from registration, to House Games, to selling merchandise in the Shack, this year's volunteer brigade made it possible for the reunion to be such a success.

Other reunion firsts included the "Shack Merhantile" reporting record sales, sporting new items such as books, embroidered clothing, music and jewelry. Thursday night's Thai dinner used two buses and a tent to handle the overflow, in successfully feeding some 200 people. House Game participation reached well over 100 people, and not one but TWO bands performed on Saturday night.

The Board and entire ISB Network thanks each and everyone of you who volunteered, who attended, and who encouraged fellow alumni to attend – together, we made this reunion special – we definitely got Royally Connected!

## How Come We Were Dancing at 2:15 AM?

I went to the San Antonio and Seattle reunions and had a good time seeing old friends, but felt there was something missing. In 1993 I attended the ISB board meeting and suggested that perhaps the DJ's we were hiring weren't quite doing justice to the music that had meant so much to us during the Bangkok experience. People just seemed to wander off after the Saturday night dinner was over and no one stayed to dance. I agreed to try to locate some ex-Bangkok band members and form a band to perform two sets at the Clearwater, Florida reunion in August 1994 if Dave Wilkerson would agree to arrange for the equipment.

I had played bass with several bands while in Bangkok, and my wife, Babette, had sung with the Young Internationals while at ISB. It was a beginning but I had a long way to go to get a band together.

I heard that Kevin Farenholtz, '69, now lived in Maryland and I was very delighted to find out that he had kept playing the guitar and singing. I was really impressed to find out how much his voice and guitar playing had developed over the years. I knew I had to buy a bass quickly and get practicing.

I was hoping to get in touch with band mate Steve Rogers, '68, from the "March Happenings" but found out he was in Hawaii. Fortunately, his sister Terry Rogers, '72, was located only 40 minutes away in Columbia, Maryland and had played organ in Bangkok. When asked if she was interested, she replied, "I'd love to but I haven't touched a keyboard in 20 years". I said "That's OK, I haven't even seen a bass guitar in 25 years."

A couple of weeks later I heard that Keith Hatton, '70, had been located in Fredrick, Maryland. Remembering the great times we had together performing with the "Erbs of Love" during the 1968/69 school year, I was so glad when he agreed to join the band as lead guitarist. He also admitted that he hadn't touched a guitar in a number of years but had been playing classical piano. I informed him, "No problem, you are ahead of me!"

Keith mentioned that his wife, Peggi, could sing and would be willing to do some backup vocals if we needed them. Keith and Peggie had met while attending Penn State and were married in 1975. From the first time Peggi came to practice, we realized what a great addition she would be to the band and the music.

Although Peggi never attended ISB, she has become an honorary alumnus over the years.

Now the big problem...a drummer! I thought our problems were over when I called an ex-drummer alumni located in Maryland. Unfortunately, he was unavailable at the time so we continued to practice for a few months with no drummer. With a little research into the current computer technologies related to music, we decided to use our PCs and a little "Midimagic" as our drummer so that we could practice.

I contacted Mike Jepsen '70 (also an ex 'Erbs of Love' member) who had been playing professionally since high school. To my surprise he was excited about the idea of playing with a bunch of amateurs at the next reunion a few months away. Since he lived in Utah, we sent him a couple of cassettes with the 2 sets of songs on them and asked him to show up at the reunion a day early so we could practice.

Consistent with maintaining a drummer's reputation, Mike showed up 6 hours late with a half packed suitcase and informed us that he had lost the cassettes but found a whole bunch of Singha downstairs. This was obvious! We decided to have a practice in the hotel room with a couple of little 15 watt amps and Mike's knees as drums. It went pretty well but most of us were still a little skeptical of what we had agreed to do.

The next day we set up the equipment and had a real practice. It was amazing how much better we sounded with a real drummer...and what a drummer Mike turned out to be! We quickly realized that Mike could play better than any drummer we had ever met. Immediately after practice Mike pulled me aside and said "John, Babette and Peggi can really sing!". My first reaction was to respond with the typical French phrase "but of course, you idiot" but instead inquired "what do you mean?". Mike responded, "I've learned over the years, John, to be somewhat cautious when people say 'the wives are gonna sing with the band'".

When Saturday night came, we were all extremely nervous. This was the first time we would be playing for our friends and fellow alumnae. We only hoped that they would enjoy the music and that we would play well enough that they wouldn't boo us off the stage. But after the first few songs, the dance floor was packed. What a rush it was seeing everyone having such a great time! We played two sets and the dance floor was just as full for the last song as it had been at the beginning. The hard work had paid off and we were elated.

We agreed to play at the Dallas reunion. We dou-

bled our song list to provide a full four sets. None of us had any idea how difficult this would be at our age. I remember the high school band routine where one of the members would bring a reel-to-reel tape of a "brand new song from the States". We would listen to it, figure out the chords, some of the breaks (usually modifying them to match our limited talent, uh, I mean derful people who selflessly support it with hours and "style") and try to figure out the words.

While we tried to practice every two weeks, this was not as easy as it was in high school when you were single and only had to worry about being as cool as possible. We now had day jobs, children, vacations, church activities, school activities, family obligations and homes, automobiles, boats, tractors (Keith and Peggi live in Fredrick) airplanes and a whole host of other material objects to keep up.

In any event, we learned a number of valuable lessons with regards to the Dallas performance: 1) Four sets is too much for a band that doesn't play very often 2) practices can feel a lot like work when you have that many songs to cover and 3) when you are our age, you can't always remember all newly acquired valuable lessons.

Due to the complex logistics involved and the need for a break, the band decided not to play at the 1998 reunion in California. Time seemed to fly by and all of a sudden it was late 1999 and we decided to start practicing for the Williamsburg reunion.

Williamsburg was a lot of fun for us. We were nervous since we hadn't played for four years. Also because we had decided to use our own equipment and do the sound ourselves. (Gotta use all those toys we bought over the years.) Again, we discovered that we are just too old to be hauling all that equipment around - where are the roadies when you need them? But the playing and singing itself was almost as amazing as it had been in Clearwater (of course, nothing can beat the first time). It is so much fun looking out at the dance floor and seeing people having a great time. All the hard work is definitely worthwhile! A special treat for me was being able to see the Sonics perform again. I remember dancing to their great music the first year I arrived in Bangkok. My dream was to someday play in a band half as good.

All in all, we feel extremely fortunate to have been able to play music with the intent it was created for: to enjoy performing with friends and provide enjoyment to people who mean so much to us. It has taken me years to finally understand what Mike meant when he said that he had more fun playing at the reunion in Clearwater than any other gig in his life. Considering

he had played literally thousands of gigs over many years as a professional musician, I thought he was just being nice. No, I can see now that there is big difference between playing for a crowd of drunks and playing for a bunch of extremely 'happy' and supportive friends. I can't thank the ISB Network and the wonhours of work. My special thanks goes to the members of the band who have spent so much time and effort to make it possible! John Dammon '69

#### In Memory of...

Lois Crittenden, the mother of ISB alums Simon (1974), Peter (1977), Jules (1978) and Will (departed ISB 1978), died Sept. 28, 2000, in Elizabeth City, NC, after a brief illness. She was 76.

A native of Melbourne, Australia, she raised her four boys in Indonesia, Australia, California, East Pakistan and Thailand, where her husband worked as an engineer. Along the way she had to deal with her children's cases of hepatitis, dengue and scarlet fever; periodic cholera scares, weekly forced doses of malaria pills and the occasional rabies series; cyclones and floods; several military coups and riots; infestations of cobras, pit vipers, banded kraits, pythons, kamoys, and of course cockroaches the size of hamsters. She saw to it that her boys were exposed to the art, culture, language and historic places of the countries they lived in, as well as the best of western history, literature and culture. When they were older, she was good enough to let her boys loose to travel the Thai countryside on their own, for all of which they remain grateful..

At ISB, Mrs. Crittenden briefly taught remedial classes in the 1970s. She also volunteered as a guide and librarian at the National Museum in the 1970s, and taught at an English-language kindergarten in the 1980s. She also was a long-time member of the Royal Varuna Yacht Club at Pattaya, and a devotee of sunsets over Koh Larn. She recalled her 13 years in Thailand as the best of her life. We were glad she was independent and lived as she chose until her last days

The ISB Network is currently looking for two computer literate volunteers to contribute to the Network and become Board of Directors members – Newsletter Director and Class Reps.

Each class coordinator represents 5 graduating classes as follows: 60-64, 65-69, 70-74 etc. There shall be a minimum of 2 class coordinators per 5 year period.


