When I accepted the position of President of the ISBN, I had a vision that I believed to be shared by others, and I knew this was my opportunity to act on that vision. I wanted to work with the BOD and the membership to make the ISB Network a place where each of us would be able to find long lost friends from a place far away from home (if in fact we even had a place to call home). To this end we have grown our ISB Network to 800 members, and in August 2010 we will host our biggest reunion ever. As I write this we have more than 600 planning to attend, and if reservation history holds true we well may see 700. What good news, and better yet, we are booked into a hotel where this can happen with room for all of our planned events in the same area – no splitting us up into different rooms as we have had to do in past reunions.

This is a good time to THANK all who have made their reservations thus far, some made just a few days after leaving the 2008 reunion in San Diego. Those early reservations sent a vote of confidence to the Cavalier Hotel to not accept any reservations outside of our group for the reunion weekend —so the hotel will be totally ours and we can enjoy each others' company 24 hours a day without worrying about disturbing other guests. We have a back up hotel booked that is close walking distance for those who decide to join us after the Cavalier is sold out. So it's important to know that we can accommodate all who want to attend the reunion, even those who simply arrive with no prior notice. However, if you do arrive as a "walk-in" please understand that there are some things that we won't have for you — such as a name badge with your photo. You'll still get the name badge—just no "back then" photo attached.

First Reunion?




If You're Flying into Norfolk—Shuttle Service

Here is some information on shuttle service if you're flying into Norfolk, Virginia, which is the closest airport to VAB and the Reunion. Carey Transportation offers a shuttle service from the Norfolk Airport - the first person going to The Cavalier rides for \$41 one way and the 2nd, 3rd and 4th for an additional \$5 each for a total of \$56 or \$14 each - WHAT A BARGAIN. 

And now for an update on our upcoming book: the contributions from all 22 authors have been received and we are finalizing the book and 'pitching' our project to literary agents.

In addition to Mr. Phil Reeves and 17 ISB alumni, we have contributions from:

Dr. Akira Endo: One of the greatest scientists of the 20th century, Dr. Endo is a biochemist whose work on fungi and cholesterol led to the development of the highly successful class of statin drugs. He was awarded the 22nd Japan Prize in 2006 and the Lasker Award in 2008.

Alan Dean Foster: Mr. Foster's works include hard science-fiction, fantasy, horror, detective, western, historical, and contemporary fiction. He has written non-fiction articles on film, science, and scuba diving, as well as having produced the novel versions of many films (Star Wars, the first three Alien films, Alien Nation, The Chronicles of Riddick, Star Trek, Terminator:Salvation, and both Transformers films).

Dr. Jeffry Camm: Dr. Camm, a qualified engineer, has completed many international projects to provide infrastructure in developing countries thereby improving the quality of life for the inhabitants. Dr. Camm has authored 13 Christian books.

Eva Raphael: Born in France, she moved to the US when she was 9. She graduated from Lycée Français La Pérouse, in San Francisco, in 2001. She majored in Molecular and Cell Biology at the University of California at Berkeley, and completed an MPH in Environmental Health Sciences in 2008. She works as a lab assistant in the laboratory of Professor Lee Riley. She is fluent in French, Spanish, Portuguese, and English.

Lee Riley '68: Professor of Infectious Diseases and Epidemiology in the School of Public Health at the University of California, Berkeley. His research focuses on tuberculosis and drug-resistant bacterial infections. He has published more than 180 journal articles and book chapters, and is the author of a textbook, Molecular Epidemiology of Infectious Diseases: Principles and Practices

Andy Bernay-Roman '68: Psychotherapist at the Hippocrates Health Institute in West Palm Beach. He is an RN, LMHC, NCC, and LMT. Andy's book, "Deep Feeling, Deep Healing", is published in several languages.

Paul Soderberg '67: Paul is a writer. His first book was a 1,072-page reference book not on snakes but on sports, The

Big Book of Halls of Fame (New York and London: R.R. Bowker, 1977); his latest book, with Lisa Wojna, was a guidebook for Canadian tourists, Weird, Wacky and Wild Arizona Trivia (Edmonton: Blue Bike Books, 2008). His Thailand novel, The Elephant Queen, was published in 2005.

Dee Woodhull '70: Consultant in occupational safety and health.

Mike Bennett '68: Entered the Air Force in 1973 and remained in the Active/Reserve forces for 22 years. He flew A-10's, F-111's and F-16's. He is currently employed as a pilot for Southwest Airlines.

Ann Ladd Ferencz '71: Artist for Westco Productions Healing Walls Project, painting murals for hospitals and nonprofit organizations. She also teaches Drawing and Painting at the Rye Art Center, and is a docent for The Neuberger Museum of Art.

Walteen Grady Truely '69: Coordinates undergraduate studies at Penn State University Wilkes Barre, and teaches education theory and policy and educational psychology.



A Message From The River Kwae Riding Camp

Dear Friends around the world,

Our apologies to those of you who did not receive an e mail in October telling you that Verna passed away peacefully in her sleep on Oct. 8th at 10:30 p.m. at the River Kwae Family Camp. It was exactly six months after her 91st birthday. She had entered the hospital in Bkk. on Dec. 30, 2008 with an infection that caused sores on her legs. On the 10th she had a stroke which left her bedridden with her mind clear from time to time. I stayed with her the whole time. We left the hospital on Feb. 13, 2009. At home a nurse took care of her full time for almost eight months. And then she passed away, she was cremated at our Buddhist temple and her ashes will be taken to the Erawan Reservoir according to her wishes. She was an integral part of camp, it will be hard, in some cases, impossible to replace her. Her long illness had prepared me slowly for the inevitable. No more long discussions about world matters, no more help with the writing of my stories, no more just sharing the daily life with a close friend.

To catch you up with Camp News----Like mostly everywhere else we had unusually heavy rains from March to Oct. Trees and plants welcomed them, we had the most beautiful foliage, especially in the riding area where the trees are tall and close to

each other forming a solid wall breaking the force of the frequent storms. Visitors exclaim with amazement at finding this green oasis so near to the city. The negative side of these heavy rains are the floods rushing down, bringing debris. Our atap (palm) roofs of the stables and other buildings suffered badly, we repaired them temporarily with sheets of plastic, more or less successfully. We plan to replace the traditional atap with tiles. The atap is so much cooler but now its not practical because the quality of atap is very poor, it is hard to find the labor to handle this kind of roofing. Camp attendance is low, partly due to the economy, partly by the compition from riding "schools" popping up like mushrooms in Bkk. The quality of many of them ??? Due to your repeated generous donations we manage to survive. Our appreciation and thanks to you.

We plan now to set up a camping site for school campers with up to three hundred children at a time for three nights. Schools are required to stage two to three camp sessions per year. We plan to build permanent bathing and toilet facilities, the sleeping and dining to use tents. Wish us good luck for this new enterprise. The funding will come from the sale of a plot of land to Seiko, a long time friend and Japanese camp supervisor.

During the past year we lost several of our four legged friends and faithful workers, mostly due to old age. Reducing the number to 26, we will have to look for some new younger ones.

As for the family, everyone is fortunately still living at camp. The eight grandchildren are growing up fast. Pear, age 20 is attending Rachaphat University here in Kanchanaburi. Punch, age 14 is in her second year in a special English program in middle school. Peck's twins, age 15 and the younger one, age 13 have outgrown our ponies and replaced them with motorbikes. Piet's son also prefers bikes. His daughter, Proud, age 15 is riding regularly leading groups and exercising our two big horses. Last but not least, Prap, age 7 is a computer wis.

Piet is the village elder, assisted by his wife, Sue, handling a mountain of jobs and problems. Plus computer related jobs and being your e mail man.

Peck is busy with his truck jobs and a devoted father to his boys. Nop, is kept busy being head of a local public health center.

All the remaining jobs fall on Puki's shoulders. Riding instructor, stable manager, camp coordinator, food and kitchen purchaser, handling all money affairs and bookkeeping with some assistance from a special long time riding friend, Meo. She is driver for all errands, grandmother to eight, e mail correspondent and still working with the autistic children twice a week.

Myself, I am trying to stay healthy with the help of numerous pills and check ups every three months at Paolo Hospital in Bkk. Trying to help out with the camp where ever I can. Despite failing eye site caused by a nerve condition I continue to write my stories using a unique system of writing with quite large letters which are then read by Valerie Philbrick, typed up and e mailed to Bridgette McDonald, the book coordinator. Sharing my one room apt. (to some it is known as the condo) with my 85% dalmation, Panda. For walking I need the support of a walker for short distances. Going to the camp grounds I depend on my buggy. My daily routine in the afternoon is to drive around the riding trails to give Panda esercise. In spite of my eyes I can follow the trails by observing the different shapes of the trees.

Do not expect Verna's prompt response to your communications but we will try our best to keep in touch. Hoping this e mail finds you all in good health we wish you a wonderful and a successful year of tiger.

February 2010- Phoenix SSS Mini-Reunion

In February 2010, I did something that I thought would never happen. I sat at a Denny's and had breakfast with my brother, Mike, and an old buddy from my Student Science Society (SSS) days at ISB, Paul "Snakeman" Soderberg. Back then, Paul was the penultimate young scientist and already a noted expert in herpetology. I remember following Paul on his reptile hunting excursions in the Thai countryside during our SSS field trips. I have to count going on a night excursion as one of the dumber things I ever agreed to. Paul stopped our little group and said there was a green pit viper. I was looking at the ground and could not see it. Finally Paul told me to look in the tree a few feet in front of me. Sure enough, the green TREE pit viper was hanging there waiting for me to walk into it.

Denny's was a much safer venue for our reunion. The main purpose of our visit was to work on our book project, "The Science Club", but we also caught up on the 43 years that have passed since we last saw each other. Despite the passing of so many years, I was surprised at how 'in sync' Paul and I were. To hear us talk you would have thought we had been in constant contact over those four decades.
