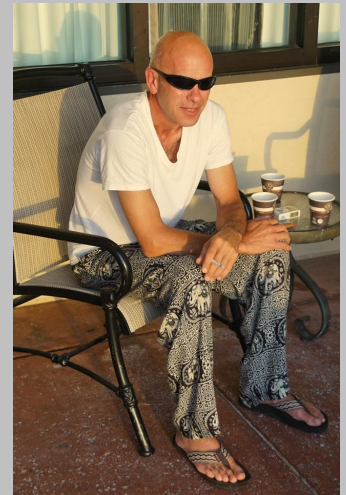
Please join me in welcoming Peppy, Don and Chris to the Board! We are so grateful they have volunteered to serve and contribute their time and talent.

Thailand Mourns the Death of Their King

His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand, **born December 5, 1927, died October 13, 2016, age 88**, was the world's longest serving constitutional monarch.

King Bhumibol was an accidental monarch, thrust onto the throne at 18 by the violent death of his older brother in 1946. He fully embraced the role of national patriarch, upholding Thailand's traditions of hierarchy, deference and loyalty.

The young Bhumibol had spent most of his young life abroad and at the time of his accession was studying at Lausanne University. The new king, a shy, bespectacled, almost withdrawn young man, took the dynastic name Rama IX and became the ninth sovereign of the Chakri dynasty.

Despite these inauspicious beginnings, over the following decades King Bhumibol turned Thailand's new constitutional monarchy into a resounding success. For most of his reign he was credited with being a moderating influence on corrupt politicians, scheming bureaucrats and ambitious generals.

He developed an extraordinary rapport with ordinary Thais, and would spend most of every year travelling between a series of palaces around the country. From these he would lead 40-strong convoys of assorted Jeeps and Land-Rovers down dusty roads deep into the countryside meeting local people, visiting rural projects or entertaining local dignitaries.

The King stayed abreast of scientific developments, and was also an accomplished painter, photographer, and musician. Playing his saxophone, he performed with a jazz group in the studios of the royal radio station.



The King is survived by his wife, Queen Sirikit and their four children. He is succeeded to the throne by HRH Crown Prince Maha Vajiralongkorn.

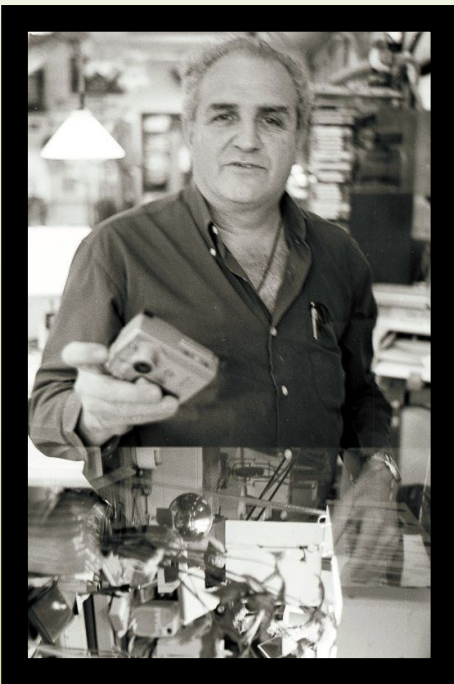
The Wizard of ISB Retires

1987 - 1998

After 27 creative years of teaching and inspiring thousands of ISB students, Archarn Jerry Hochberg retired from ISB at the end of the 2015-16 school year.

Jerry started his ISB teaching career at the Soi 15 campus in 1989, teaching yearbook and art. Jerry was a consummate innovator, and with Jerry as advisor and teacher, the 1990 Erawan staff, for the first time in ISB history, produced the entire yearbook using desktop publishing software on Macintosh computers.



With the move to the Nichida Thani campus in 1991 where he had more classroom space, Jerry expanded his course offerings to include Jewelry, Industrial Design and Sculpture. Jerry's classroom was always a world apart from all others at ISB, and anyone who took one of Jerry's classes will know exactly what I am talking about. Jerry was able to integrate traditional Thai style jewelry benches with high tech hand tools and audio-video and computer technology within his stimulating and eclectic teaching space. His reputation for genius, creativity and just having the coolest classroom and courses ever went beyond ISB to all the other IASAS schools as a result of the many Cultural Convention (CC) workshops that Jerry conducted for the benefit of the CC Art student representatives when ISB was hosting.



Jerry's passion for life, art, design, engineering and creativity has been an inspiration not only for his students but also to the many faculty members who worked with him during his years at the school. We wish you a happy well-earned retirement and many more years of artistic creation, Mr. Hochberg!

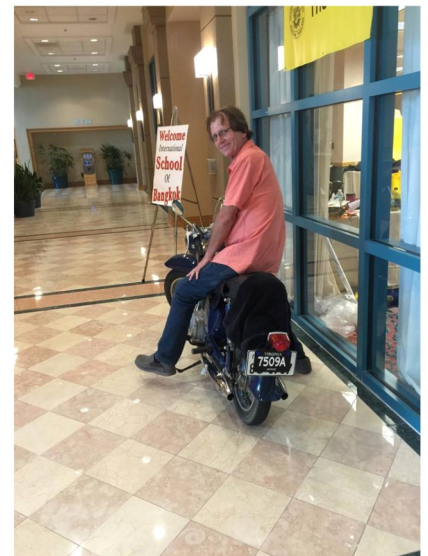

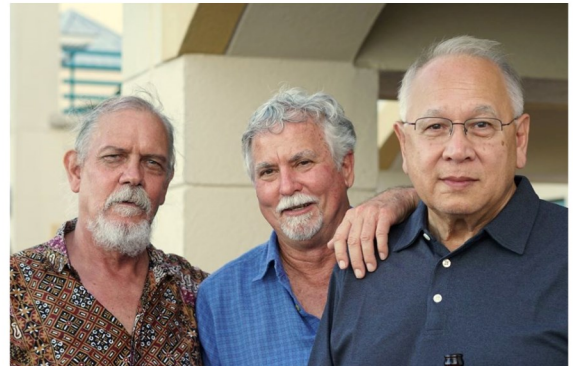












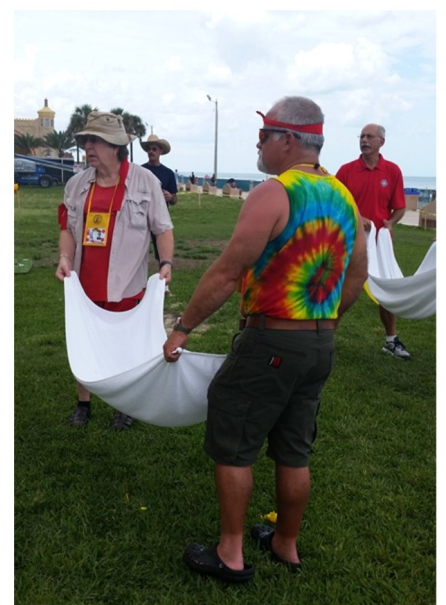
