From the Board

You might wonder how we run the ISBN board when our volunteer members are all over the USA and one in Europe? It's easy – we use email...alot, and of course calls and texting. We use conference calling to conduct monthly board meetings, which are held on Sundays. We pay membership and reunion dues just like everyone else and our travel expenses are our own. No one has any expenses involved in this activity, nor does the Network or Foundation incur any expense because of us.

In addition to hosting the reunion, we are involved in many outreach activities, all of which are intended to reunite long-lost friends and to ensure that new alumni can find us 10 or 15 years down the road. Our current and past outreach activities have included

- Maintaining the website which includes the alumni search feature and the Shack mercantile page.
- Maintaining the ISBN Alumni Association Facebook page.
- Preparing newsletters and mailings to members and nonmembers alike.
- Building relationships at the school
- Providing free 10-year memberships to new ISB graduates
- Advertising in the Erawan each year, knowing that 10-15-20 years from now, new ISB alumni will find us while flipping through their old yearbook
- Offering a poster to hang in your favorite Thai restaurant to promote the ISBN (found on the website)

Despite not being a relief organization, the Foundation's charitable mission of encouraging philanthropy and cultural exchange between the US and Thailand enabled us to partner with the school. Several years ago we assisted in the ISB Tsunami Relief Network.

Your \$40 membership dues (which has not increased since 1995!) helps support the ISBN with a portion going to deserving ISB graduates in the form of scholarships.

The ISBNetwork Foundation,Inc. is a not-for-profit, 501-C-3organization, dedicated to bringing Alumni of International School Bangkok together to support, maintain, and create contacts between people who shared similar experiences in Thailand. We serve as the Official Alumni Association for International School Bangkok.

Dues & Benefits: Membership fees are \$40 for 2 years and are tax deductible. Our goal is to provide you with three newsletters per year and access to contact information of all known ISB Alumni. You do not have to be a member to be listed on the website/directory or to attend a reunion. Your paid membership helps support the activities performed by the all-volunteer Board of Directors, responsible for maintaining the database, publishing the newsletters, maintaining presence on the web, and planning the biennial reunions.

Thank you to all who attended the ISB Reunion Focus Group and the Outreach Roundtable discussion in Nashville. Great insight was shared that day and then shared with the ISBN Board. Some of the factors are already being discussed amongst the Board, some we are looking for help with, and some are answered in this newsletter!

Discussion included questions such as:

- What do you know about the ISB Network?
- How familiar are you with the Board of Directors?
- What do you love about our organization?
- What do you think are the pros and cons the ISB Network?
- Outside of the Reunion, what can we improve to provide alumni the best experience / service?

Within the realm of the Reunion:

- Which factors prompted you to attend this year's reunion?
- Which factors were roadblocks that kept you from attending in the past?
- What is your WOW factor about reunions?

The following is one or two lines taken from some of the members at the focus group...in no particular order:

• Not familiar with board - More communication regarding the Foundation – our members don't understand the function of the foundation.

- Don't be afraid to repeat popular venues (ie Daytona and Virginia Beach)
- Comradery and meeting through reunions
- More transparency with the budget and finances
- Some don't know there are two entities (Network and Foundation) or what it is that they do…including Board responsibilities, how they meet, decision making steps, and time spent
- Website could be more user friendly
- Friendship, Family, Reconnection with old friends!
- Encourage more 'state' mini-group reunions
- How do we get younger members? Aging membership ISB's smaller population. After 80s there are no younger classes to take over Board should focus on this
- Global initiatives that initiate service opportunities
- Common connections even if we have differing opinions
- Appreciation for board and reunion volunteers

These WOW factors, or things they would like to see at future reunions, were mentioned several times by members:

- Session outside of the standard teen club, party suites or house games ie: interesting guest speakers, short Thai language or Thai dancing class, service projects to Thailand, what is ISB like now
- Excursions, bus tour, walking tour, offer a field trip or history session of the city

Reunion items that members would like to see continue:

- Welcome greeters and first-time attendee ribbons are great
- Loved the service project
- Shack inventory was phenomenal this year
- And of course...meeting new friends and reconnecting with old ones!

80'S ALUM GIVE BACK

Kudos to Patricia De Martini Williams, '84 (right), who spearheaded one of the events at the Nashville reunion. Global Health Charities (GHC), is an organization founded by Patty and on who's board sits another ISB alumnus, Earl Bridges '83. GHC is dedicated to saving the lives of mothers and infants in remote communities throughout Asia, Africa and Latin



America. They provide training, education and materials essential to a clean and healthy birth, with the goal of reducing infection related deaths.

What began as a plan by Bruce Williamson '84, to engage the 80's alumni in a service project, quickly generated a bit of excitement at the reunion. Forty-two alumni squeezed into a conference room and assembled 216 birthing kits, which translates into potentially 432 lives saved, because when there is an infection relat-



ed death in childbirth, typically it results from a dirty tool utilized to cut the umbilical cord and both mom and the baby are affected. Over \$1,230 was raised in donations to purchase the supplies for the kits and to fund the transportation of the kits to Thailand.

Thailand was designated as the recipient country given the recognition that we all received so much while living there and wanted to give back. However, this became a historic donation

for GHC. Typically, the kits are distributed in very remote communities where hospitals are difficult to access. In this case, GHC was asked by the Ministry of Public Health, to donate the kits to the Royal Thai Police for use in Bangkok. Apparently, many babies are born on the streets of Bangkok due to traffic jams (which we all have endured!) making it difficult to get to the hospital in time. The police are being trained to deliver babies, but they don't have the supplies. They will now be using our alumni assembled clean birth kits for the first time, in an urban setting!

In January, the clean birth kits were delivered by Patricia, Mr. Harold Albert, ISB Alumni Director, IASAS Director and former faculty member, as well as Jun Ikeda '83 to Bangkok's Ministry of Public Health. They shared with the MoPH how much it meant for all of us to have lived in Thailand, how much we were impacted and how so many of the ISB alum still think of Thailand as home. As a result of these efforts, Mr.

Albert is going to try to plan a birthing kit event for current ISB students in 2019!

Due to the enthusiasm and success of this event, and results of the reunion focus group and survey, there is a strong possibility a service-oriented project will be held at the 2020 reunion.

Thank you to GHC, ISB alumni who made this happen and all the enthusiastic volunteers and donors!

What we learned and what we know.

Our reunions are fairly complex now compared to the early days. As human nature goes, people want more for less and social media makes that even more difficult. What I mean is this: People want to post on a dynamic wall that is almost impossible

to track and much of it is unreasonable, especially if they were to take the time to actually read our criteria. Finally, hotels are revenue-driven these days. They pay close attention to revenue reports from previous reunion properties. What does this mean? Corporate functions are more profitable for hotels over organizations like us for several reasons.

- 1. They don't nickel & dime on price like we do
- 2. Attendees do not share rooms, double, triple, and quad like we do
- 3. They spend a lot more money in the bars and restaurants than we do. We tend to stock our rooms with food and alcohol, whereas corporate conferences do not.

We learned much from our discussions at the Nashville reunion and our post reunion poll results. The main thing we learned was that we send the poll to the membership and reunion attendees (i.e., more than 600 people) but only 119, or approximately 23%, choose to actually participate in the post-reunion poll. This has been the case in almost every instance.

There are a couple of factors outside of apathy that might contribute to this.

- 1. Some people have opted out of Constant Contact email notifications.
- 2. Some people do not update their contact information; therefore, our database may not have a valid email address for them.
- 3. Some people never check their spam and might not have received the notification
- 4. Some people seldom check their email, and by the time they do, the poll is closed.

So what do we do to make people aware?

We post on Facebook that the invitation was sent to members, reaching approximately 1,800 people. We stress the importance of updating their contact information, and ask them to do so at our biennial reunions. That is about the best we can do.

We started our search based on input received from attendees at the reunion and email correspondence. The areas we began searching were:

Southern, CA Seattle/Tacoma, WA Phoenix/Tucson, AZ Reno/Tahoe, NV.

We began by asking people to write to us and give us suggestions based on our criteria of which only a few people did. We sent out a RFP (request for price) and our reunion criteria document to the hotels suggested and to the CVB (convention visitor bureau) for those areas, concentrating initially on Seattle/Tacoma and Southern, CA as they were 1 and 2 in the poll selection. However, we came up with no viable offers. We then focused on Phoenix/Tucson and Reno/Tahoe and even Colorado (this decision was based on our poll). To date, we have had one serious offer between the three and are expecting two more. The single offer and one of the two possibilities are in Arizona.

I am traveling West again in March with hopes of finding more reunion hotel options, but we are needing to make our decision soon because the offered properties in hand will only hold the room block for just so long.

Finally, the one thing I can guarantee is: We will have a reunion in 2020, it will be great, and the people that attend will have the time of their lives. See you somewhere out West!
