- Adequate banquet space for The Shack, The Archives, Saturday night dinner, and Sunday breakfast.






LEGACIES OF WAR BY SERA KOULABDARA

LEGACIES OF WAR CONTINUED

Most of you know the gist of my story. Today, I want to share more of who I am and the superhumans who nurtured and shaped my life. I never understood the harsh realities that my parents had to face leaving war-torn Laos with 4 children, all 10 years and under. Nor did I appreciate their strength until I was older. By the time I was 11 years old, we lived in 4 different states and at one point, in order to give us the best chance in life, my parents had to force themselves to leave my older brother and I with our aunts for 2 years. They worked 2-3 odd jobs each until we all reunited and moved to Ohio in 1995.

My childhood was full of hardships, universal ones faced by refugees and immigrants like lack of food, difficult living situations, trauma from war, displacement and many more. Yet, it was a happy one with a loving family. We made it to this day because my parents were dedicated, fought for a better life and asked for help. They knew they didn't have to do this all alone.

My parents' sacrifices paid off. I'm their wildest hope and dreams. Who would have thought that the 6-year-old little girl (me!) would be leading Legacies, an organization that is making huge impacts for millions of people today? Especially having the opportunity to give back to two countries they love so deeply the US and Laos. I wouldn't be where I am today without my parents, my family, the community and you, my closest circle.

As I reflect on where Legacies is today, I want to share a candid thought and like my parents, I know I am not alone. I seek your support, guidance and friendship as we plan for the next 5 yrs.

ISB ALUMNI AND CLEAN BIRTH KITS

In 2018, during our All Class Reunion in Nashville, TN, Patricia De Martini Williams (1984) brought supplies to assemble Clean Birth Kits and shared her story with us.

Since graduating from ISB in 1984, Patty's career as a healthcare executive in international hospital and health services management led her to found a company in 2008, Global Health Services Network (GHSN), with the goal of making a positive and sustainable impact on the health status of communities served around the world. Recognizing that there were significant additional needs in the communities being served, Patty with the help of her fellow board members, including Earl Bridges (1983), started Global Health Charities (GHC) to address the sad and preventable deaths that occur in mothers and newborns who don't have access to clean supplies during childbirth. GHC focuses on funding and supporting charitable initiatives to reduce infection-related mortality of maternal and infants in more than 22 countries.

Every year 4,000,000 infants and 287,000 mothers die due to childbirth related causes. 90% of these deaths are preventable. Infection is the second leading cause of death. The GHC Clean Birth Kit (CBK) program is working to reduce maternal and infant mortality in global communities in need by providing training and clean supplies within a CBK for childbirth. A Clean Birth Kit contains clean birthing supplies (including soap, gauze, gloves, clean blanket, alcohol wipes and a clean razor to cut the umbilical cord) for women and babies giving birth in under-resourced countries, many of whom deliver at home due to distance, poverty, and/or cultural norms.

ISB ALUMNI AND CLEAN BIRTH KITS CONTINUED

In 2018, the ISB Alumni Reunion Nashville attendees assembled 216 kits that ultimately were delivered to the Thai Ministry of Public Health on January 14, 2019, by Patty herself, Harold Albert and Jun Ikeda. Harold Albert also brought the CBK assembly activity to students at ISB, with several groups participating over the years. In 2021, the Tucson attendees raised funds for the supplies and then assembled kits that awaited shipment and eventually were sent to Ukraine after a maternity hospital was bombed in 2022. These were used to deliver babies in bomb shelters. In 2023, the Daytona Beach attendees and several family members continued this tradition of service by raising the funds and assembling over 200 kits.

Patty has shared that the logistics of transportation and global customs requirements often play a factor in where the kits can be distributed. In particular, Thailand and Myanmar (Burma) have several challenges. One country, among the 27 to which GHC has delivered over 27,000 CBKs, is Nigeria, where the infant mortality rate is one of the highest in the world at 72 deaths per 1,000 births. The Daughters of Charity in Nigeria have received over 7,200 CBKs over the last 7 years. Since this program was initiated, the eight clinics they operate have not lost a baby, therefore meeting the mission of Global Health Charities: "to save the lives of mothers and infants in communities in need around the world by providing training, education and materials essential to a clean and healthy birth."

The mission of GHC is fulfilled entirely through volunteers assembling the kits at events like our alumni reunions, donations and the sale of baby blankets which each, at \$10, fund one birth kit.

We are excited to host another CBK event at our next alumni reunion. Once we have raised funds and gathered the supplies, we will need 20-30 volunteers on Saturday morning in Scottsdale to assemble these kits. Loy Krathong, Florida Style

Celebrating Thai tradition and the life of Susan Haralson



The History of Loy Krathong

Loy Krathong or Loi Krathong (ລອຍກຣະກູນ), known as Thailand's Festival of Lights, is an annual traditional Siamese festival celebrated by Thais on the 12th full moon of the Thai lunar calendar to pay respect to the Goddess of Water and the Buddha.

A krathong is a small, decorative float made primarily from banana leaves, traditionally resembling a lotus flower or a small boat. The krathong is typically adorned with flowers, candles, incense sticks, and sometimes coins or small offerings. The floating krathongs carry the hopes, wishes, and gratitude of individuals as they navigate along rivers, lakes, or canals during the festival. This act symbolizes letting go of negative emotions and paying respect to the water spirits.

Celebrating Florida Style

The Florida Alumni Chapter of the ISB Alumni Association gathers each year to continue the Loy Krathong tradition. Initially, the FL group gathered in the Tampa Bay area, but for the past two years, they have celebrated in Cocoa Beach, FL. This year's celebration included paying tribute to Susan Elena Haralson, class of '75, who passed away earlier this year in February. Susan loved Loy Krathong and wanted to be remembered at this event. The 2024 celebration was our largest one with over 70 people in attendance.

On Friday, November 15, many of the ISBers met at White Sands Buddhist Center, Mims, FL, where we enjoyed the tranquility of the Center and spent time getting reacquainted with the Loy Krathong regulars and making new friends with those who were attending for the first time. Later, we checked into the Beachside Hotel and Suites and spent many hours poolside, and then swapping stories in the party suites.

Saturday, November 16, we gathered in the breakfast area to make our floating boats. The ISBers shared flowers, and thanks to Jolli Sidon and Lora Yount Keating, we had banana stalks and the supplies we needed to create our krathongs. A huge shout out to Sid and Marlone for helping us to stabilize our boats with the addition of outriggers.

Before floating our krathongs at sunset, we enjoyed a late lunch (early dinner) at the Siam Orchid Restaurant. Thank you, Jolli and Lora, for making all the arrangements. At sunset, we launched our krathongs from a beautiful dock on the Banana River. Susan's ashes were lovingly placed in three different krathongs before we said our goodbyes to her. Susan's brother Paul and her niece Katie were in attendance and helped us to honor our Hippie Chick on her journey.

After the launchings concluded, we returned to the hotel and paid tribute to Susan with a Celebration of Life and video tribute. She was lovingly remembered by her brother Paul, her life-long friend Sue Donato, ISB sisters Jolli Sidon and Kathie/Kate Boslet. Special toasts to Susan's memory were given by The Green Fairy and The Grateful Dead. Susan may no longer be with us, but the impact she left behind is everlasting.
